To qualify for 2023 community benefit grants, an organization must be an IRS 501(c)(3) tax-exempt, non-profit and its program must address an identified health need within one of the following three funding priorities in the 2022

What Does it Mean to be Non-Profit

As a non-profit health-system, MyMichigan Health has the honor to invest back into the community by providing community benefits, which are programs and services designed to improve the community's health, increase access to high quality care and reduce the burden of government or other community efforts. Our community benefit initiatives are based on the health

priorities identified in the Community Health Needs Assessments conducted, every three years, for each of our communities. In fiscal year 2023, MyMichigan Health contributed more than \$128 million towards community benefit initiatives across our 25-county region.

MyMichigan Health's financial contribution in fiscal year 2023 funded a broad spectrum of community benefits including:


- Charity care for uninsured and financially needy
- Unreimbursed cost for providing care for those insured through Medicare, Medicaid, and other government sponsored health insurance plans
- Medical research
- Educational opportunities for health professionals
- Community health education programs and support groups
- Financial donations to support the health promotion efforts of non-profit organizations
- Community building activities that promote health and well-being of the community.

Improving the health in our communities is a responsibility we embrace, for without our communities MyMichigan Health would not exist. Community health improvement is a daunting challenge too large to belong to any single organization. Through our community benefit initiatives, we are partnering with other community organizations to live out our purpose in "Creating Healthy Communities – Together."

How Our Employees Give Back

In addition to its corporate giving program, MyMichigan's employees are also giving back. Established in 2020, MyMichigan's Community Service Time (CST) initiative makes it easier for its more than 10,000 employees to give their time and talents to local nonprofits to which they are passionate. Since the program's start, more than 150 organizations have received assistance and 5,500+ volunteer service hours have been completed by MyMichigan employees.

The program allows employees the flexibility to volunteer at events that may take place during work hours and prioritizes community involvement. Each calendar year, employees are allocated CST pay to be used while volunteering: eight hours pay for full-time and four for part-time employees.



In 2022, employees spent time reducing food insecurity (27,000 meals provided), educating residents (more than 110,000 attended programs, health fairs, and like events), supporting schools and offering preventative services, such as sports physicals and free screenings. Volunteer hours were also served at events, including Relay for Life and Special Olympics, parades, blood donations, church gatherings and time on agency board of directors.

Organizations seeking volunteer support may submit opportunities to MyMichigan

for inclusion on its CST program web listing for employees. Those interested in doing so may complete the online form at **www.mymichigan.org/community**. MyMichigan's Community Health Department will review the request within seven working days, and if approved, make the information available to our employees. Interested employees will reach out directly to the organization to communicate their interest in volunteering.
